When a young, aspirational theatre troupe discovers and decides to perform what they believe is a Syrian soap opera, they come to realize just how much they got wrong. **Kiss** is a brilliant play-within-aplay that shows how misunderstanding cultural cues can reveal blind spots you never knew you had. **Kiss** dissolves cultural borders and asks audiences to question what they believe to be true of the complicated world around them. Told in a layered, self-referential style, Chilean playwright and director Guillermo Calderón (who brought *Neva* to ArtsEmerson in 2013) brings his masterful sensibility to this intense, tightly wound new production where naiveté can turn out to be the kiss of death.

GARDENS SPEAK

Across Syria, many gardens conceal the dead bodies of activists and protesters who took to the streets during the early periods of the uprising against the Ba'athist government in 2011. These domestic burials play out a continuing collaboration between the living and the dead — each providing safety, truth and a voice for each other. In **Gardens Speak**, Lebanese artist Tania El Khoury carefully reconstructs the oral histories of ten ordinary people and transforms Syrian statistics into universal, human stories via a stunning, full-body interactive experience. In a small, dimly lit room, audience members are assigned a name, guided to a grave and instructed to dig through soil to access oral histories of forgotten citizens. Each narrative has been carefully constructed with the friends and family members of the deceased to retell their stories as they themselves may have recounted it. A 40-minute experience with only 10 audience members admitted at a time, **Gardens Speak** was a sold-out experience at The Public's *Under The Radar Festival* in New York.

Bangsokol: A Requiem for Cambodia is an extraordinary new composition fusing music, film, voice and movement. It is the first major symphonic work that addresses the traumas that occurred in Cambodia in the late seventies, and is the first collaboration between the Oscar -nominated director Rithy Panh and lauded composer Him Sophy — both survivors of the Khmer Rouge and now at the forefront of Cambodia's cultural renaissance. Anchored in "bangsokol" — a ritual for the dead or soon to be deceased — the performance intertwines traditional Khmer instrumentalists and vocalists with Western chamber orchestra and chorus to create something innately Cambodian but relatable to audiences everywhere. Bangsokol is an act of cultural renewal, aiming to return the arts to their place at the heart of Cambodian society. While the world continues to witness new genocides, wars and destruction, Bangsokol urges us to express our scars from the past in order to forge a new path forward.

Delightfully gothic, beautiful and emotionally complex, **Ada/Ava** utilizes special effect techniques from the early age of cinema — shadow puppetry, live-action silhouettes and overhead projection — to conjure a magic spell of multimedia storytelling, complete with a live musical score. Driven by innovation, the masterful technicians of Chicago-based Manual Cinema are one of the hottest rising ensembles in America, with audiences marveling at their creations even as their methods are plainly revealed. Beside a lighthouse somewhere on the New England coastline, twin sisters tend to the tower's guiding light and to each other, until Ava unexpectedly dies.
