[Boston, MA – December 4, 2018] – ArtsEmerson, Boston's leading presenter of contemporary world theatre, is excited to announce the return of Manual Cinema with their production, The End of TV. After thrilling Boston audiences with Ada/Ava in 2018, the ingenious artists of Manual Cinema cast a theatrical spell through live-action silhouettes, video feeds, overhead projection and a five-piece band performing an original score with their new creation. The End of TV runs just two weeks at the Emerson Paramount Center's Robert J. Orchard Stage located at 559 Washington Street in downtown Boston. Set in a post-industrial Rust Belt city in the 1990s and told through a collection of original 70's R&B-inspired art pop songs, **The End of TV** explores the quest to find meaning amongst the increasingly constant barrage of commercial images and advertising white-noise. Manual Cinema combines handmade shadow puppetry, cinematic techniques, and innovative sound and music to create this immersive experience for audiences. *Chicago Tribune* calls it "the very retro-coolest and most creatively compulsive show."

"I love the imagination of artists, and the artists of Manual Cinema specifically," says ArtsEmerson artistic director David Dower. "They've invented a form out of the simplest of tools, animated it with the pure joy and abandon found in child's play, and the result is fresh, fun, and surprisingly moving. The techniques here will be familiar to fans of their earlier work, but they continued to evolve their style with **The End of TV**, introducing new elements to the mix. And they've harnessed it to a timely story that sweeps over us and carries us away. I'm so happy they were able to come back so soon after their debut at ArtsEmerson last season."

About The End of TV

The End of TV depicts the promise and decline of the American rust belt, through the stories of Flo and Louise, both residents of a fictional Midwestern city. Flo is an elderly white woman who was once a supervisor at the thriving local auto plant. Now succumbing to dementia, the memories of her life are tangled with television commercials and the "call now" demands of QVC. Louise, a young black woman laid off from her job when the same local auto plant closes, meets Flo when she takes a job as a Meals-on-Wheels driver. An unlikely relationship grows as Flo approaches the end of her life and Louise prepares for the invention of a new one. Their story is intercut with commercials and TV programs, the constant background of their environment.

She is a company member with The House Theatre of Chicago and has also worked with Lookingglass Theatre (Chicago), Chicago Shakespeare Theatre, Actors Theatre of Louisville (KY), Nebraska Repertory Theatre, Aporia Theatre (NYC), and Project Y (NYC), among others. She trains in aerial/circus arts, and does performance and motion capture for video games, most recently *Call of Duty: WWII* and *Injustice 2* (Supergirl). Kara holds degrees in Theatre Performance and French from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Jeffrey Paschal (Male Ensemble, Puppeteer) Is originally from a town called Corning in Upstate New York. In 2012 Jeff moved to Chicago to go to school at Northwestern University where he majored in Theatre. At Northwestern Jeff was involved with several theatre productions including *Fabulation* directed by Jerrell Henderson and *Anna in the Tropics* directed by Henry Godinez as well as directing and producing several short films through the school's RTVF program. Jeff graduated from Northwestern with a B.S. in Theatre in 2016. He currently lives in Chicago and is represented by Gray Talent Group.

Marques Toliver (Violin, Vocals) is an international recording artist, songwriter, producer, violinist, and vocalist from Daytona Beach, Florida. He began to study music at the age of ten and later attended Stetson University's School of Music, where he studied classical violin. A move to New York, where he often busked, led him to performances and recordings with An Albatross, Grizzly Bear, TV on the Radio, Bat for Lashes, Holly Miranda, and Miles Benjamin Anthony Robinson. Toliver released the four-track EP Butterflies Are Not Free (2011). The single "Magic Look" (2012) followed as a precursor to Toliver's first album, Land of CanAan, released in May 2013. In 2016 Toliver composed music for The Public Theater's production of Romeo and Juliet.

Sharaina L. Turnage (Louise, Puppeteer) is from the notoriously awesome south side of Chicago. She is making her debut at Manual Cinema and couldn't be more thrilled to work with such an amazing company. Sharaina received her B.A. at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville where past credits include: Mayme (Intimate Apparel), LaWanda/Topsy Washington/Normal Jean (The Colored Museum), and Bernice (Servy N Bernice 4ever). Recent credits include: Los Milagros (Free Street Theater) and Grey Area (FYI). Sharaina has researched and performed theater historical done by slaves called Du Theater in Suriname, South America and was amongst one of the first actors to perform Du Theater in the United States.
