

ArtsEmerson presents <u>Projecting Connections: Chinese American Experiences</u>. Using film as a lens to reflect on the vast lived experiences of the Chinese in the Greater Boston Area, this special series will feature monthly films and post-show curated discussions designed to build and foster meaningful community conversation.

A Chinese American Giant: The Y.C. Hong Story

Director: Rick Quan

Synopsis: He stood just four feet five and a half inches, but Y.C. Hong was a giant in the Chinese American community. As the first Chinese American immigration attorney in California and civil rights activist, Hong played an important role in fighting racist laws like the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882.

About the Director: Rick Quan is an award winning journalist and documentarian. He is currently the 10 pm news anchor for KITV4, the ABC affiliate in Honolulu, Hawaii. Rick is the first Chinese American TV sports anchor in the country and the first Asian American male to be a full time anchor in San Francisco. He has also received numerous awards for his documentaries on pioneering Asian Americans. His most recent film was a half hour documentary about Y.C. Hong, the first Chinese American immigration lawyer in the country.

Vanishing Chinatown: The World of the May's Photo Studio

Synopsis: Vanishing Chinatown: The World of The May's Photo Studio brings families together: in the past by splicing together family portraits in spite of family separations due to the Chinese Exclusion Act, and in the present by reconnecting May's granddaughter with her family's legacy. These stunning photographs show San Francisco Chinatown in the early to mid-20th century, a vanishing "old Chinatown" vibrant with culture; an immigrant community becoming Americanized.

About the Director: Emiko Omori in an award winning documentary filmmaker and pioneer Asian American camera woman in San Francisco. She has produced, directed, shot, and edited a multitude of films including Rabbit in the Moon, for which she received a National Emmy award for Outstanding Historical Program. Rabbit in the Moon premiered at Sundance Film Festival, and was broadcast on public television's POV. Her works have been presented at film festivals internationally.

Meditations on the Power of Community

Synopsis: **Meditations on the Power of Community** is a short film commissioned by the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, featuring choreography by Pao Arts Center 2021 Artist-in-Residence Lenora Lee Dance, with additional support by ArtsEmerson. The film features interviews with members of Boston's Chinatown community, in response to the Museum's exhibition *Shen Wei: Painting in Motion*.

About the Artists: Lenora Lee is a dancer, choreographer, and artistic director of Lenora Lee Dance. She pushes the envelope of large-scale multimedia dance performance crafted for the proscenium, underwater, or in the air, and at times is site-responsive, immersive and interactive. Lenora's work integrates contemporary dance, film, music, and research related to immigration, global conflict, and human rights. http://www.lenoraleedance.com

About the Director: Weiying Olivia Huang is an award-winning documentary filmmaker. Her documentary 'City as Canvas' won the Best Human Interest Documentary at the World Premiere Film Awards in 2020. ArtsEmerson presents **Shared Stories**, a monthly film series in collaboration with the Boston Asian American Film Festival (BAAFF), Boston Latino International Film Festival (BLIFF), and the Roxbury International Film Festival (RoxFilm) seeking to build community, shared conversation, and experiences through cinema. This pilot series aspires to create a shared space to find commonality across experiences, and encourage the exchange of stories and ideas.

Nailed It - Nailed It chronicles the genesis and legacy of the 40 year Vietnamese nail salon and its influence on an \$8 billion-dollar American industry. For mixed-race Vietnamese filmmaker Adele Pham it's personal, as she confronts her cultural conflicts and discovers her place within the community, by peeling back the layers of this niche trade seen by everyone but known to few.

About the Director:

Adele Pham is a documentary Director/Producer who also shoots fiction narratives. In May '18 Nailed It, my feature documentary about the genesis and culture of the Vietnamese nail salon, premiered at CAAMFest in San Francisco. My vision for Nailed It changed over the course of production. What I didn't expect was the effect exploring the history of the Vietnamese salon would have on me. As a mixed race, second generation Vietnamese-American woman, there was always a disconnect from my culture, which I inadvertently found a place within by documenting the definitive history of the Vietnamese nail salon.
